USING ITUNES TO ACCESS FREE CAREER INFORMATION.

Who would have ever thought that career information could be found on iTunes? It's true and free! By subscribing to podcasts, a wealth of information is at your fingertips. Podcasts differ from Internet radio stations in that they are organized into episodes and are downloadable to your computer and iPod (so that you can listen to them when not connected to the internet). You can also subscribe to podcasts (for free) so that when new episodes are available they are automatically downloaded. The education category of iTunes podcasts presents many career related podcasts. Some of these include interviews with career specialists, career specific interviews, interviewing, and many other topics. A sample of career related podcasts include Music Career Juice, Career Talk with Tom and Ray, Pharmacology in Sports Medicine, Finding Your Ideal Career, Flight Attendant Careers, Becoming a Nurse, Deloitte Career Insights, Career Strides, Interviewing tips and much, much, more!

To access the podcasts, follow this path... These instructions are written utilizing iTunes version 7 however due to the customization of iTunes, these directions many not work exactly for everyone. The Help feature of iTunes is excellent, however and you can access your specific instructions by selecting Help and typing in "podcasts".

- Click iTunes Store (below Store).
- Click Podcasts (across the top).
- Next select the Category of Education followed by the appropriate subcategory you would like to view.
- Next, use the search box to narrow your search down. For example, type "Careers" in the search box to see all the podcasts relating to careers in a subcategory.
- Select a podcast and enjoy!
- To change the number of episodes iTunes downloads, or how often new subscribed podcasts are downloaded or to set iTunes to delete a podcast after you have listened to it, choose iTunes, Preferences and then click the Podcast.
- To unsubscribe to a podcast, select a podcast or an episode in iTunes and then click unsbuscribe.
- If you know the Internet address of a podcast, you can subscribe to it without using the iTunes store. Choose Advanced, subscribe to a podcast and enter the url. For example, the podcast for Find Your Ideal Career podcast is http://feeds.feedburner.com/findyouridealcareer.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT CAREER COACHES

Plugging the Gap in the Education Pipeline and Developing the Next Generation of Virginia's Workforce

- 26% of students entering the ninth grade in Virginia do not receive their high school diploma within four years.
- 60% do not continue to postsecondary education.
- National data indicate that individuals with an associate degree annually earn \$7,500 more than high school graduates and \$15,000 more than individuals without a high school diploma.

It is out of this context that the VCCS launched a groundbreaking new statewide initiative: Career Coaches.

Career coaches are community college employees housed in local high schools. Coaching helps "middle majority" students—the mainstay of the emerging workforce—prepare for college and careers. Career coaches offer unique benefits to students that traditional guidance counseling may not, such as direct access to college programs and services, postsecondary faculty, and business and industry.

The Virginia Community College System (VCCS) began the career coaches program in Jan. 2005 with 11 coaches based at 13 high schools. Today, more than 65 career coaches serve students in more than 80 high schools throughout the Commonwealth. In 2005-06, career coaches:

- Contacted over 28.000 students.
- Guided 11,000 students into early college or industry certification programs.
- Assisted 7,000 students to develop career and educational plans.

Preliminary data indicate program success in secondary-postsecondary partnerships, student interest in higher education and careers, and participation of business and industry as reported by high school principals.

The statewide impact of career coaches is clear. For high schools that had a career coach:

- 40% of students without college plans now plan to enroll in higher education.
- Community college enrollments are 6.5% higher.
- Enrollment in Engineering Technology and Information Technology is 19% higher.
- 60% of principals report a stronger relationship with their community college.
- 80% of students report satisfaction with their postsecondary plans.

"COLLEGES OFFER CAREER HELP TO ALUMNI"

A recent article published by the Associated Press is pertinent to those counseling professionals who work in university or college career centers. Most institutions of higher education provide current students and recent graduates with access to their career centers and its services. However, many universities and colleges have begun to offer career counseling services to those students who are not *recent* graduates. In fact, in some cases these alumni were granted their degrees more than ten years ago. At some schools, this trend is part of a broader effort of alumni relations staff to increase the level of community engagement of graduates. In other words, alumni who take advantage of these services will be more likely to give back financially to their institutions, which will, in turn, benefit current students. Another reason for providing more personalized services to alumni is the high job turnover rates in many professions. Networking through one's alma mater is an effective and logical method of finding a new job. In many cases, alumni landed their first jobs upon college graduation through programs offered by the university career center.

Offering career services to alumni is not uncharted territory for university career centers. Rather, many institutions offer some level of career services to alumni (e.g., list-serves, job banks), while a select few have long-established programs that offer more personalized services (e.g., individual career counseling, assessment tests). The significance of this trend is that career centers have begun to employ professional staff devoted solely to alumni. With this increase in hired staff come some financial dilemmas, such as how these services and employees are funded. Institutions have chosen to address this issue in different ways. Some charge nominal fees for basic services and even offer packages for more extensive services. Other institutions have financial help from their alumni associations, while still others utilize corporate grants. In some cases where alumni associations provide financial assistance, services are limited to those who are members of the alumni association because they pay membership dues.

The institutional movement to provide career services to alumni can be beneficial for both parties. However, in light of budget cuts and short-staffed career centers, this option may not be financially viable for every institution. Regardless, this article provides professionals with examples of institutions that have implemented the idea in different ways using different means of support. Current professional career center staff, especially directors, can utilize the information in this article to initiate discussions within their own department in hopes of expanding the pool of recipients who have access to career center services.

COUNSELOR EDUCATORS CREATE A REGIONAL CAREER EVEN

A collaborative effort among counselor educators, school system leaders, , VSCA and VCDA Representatives in the Northern Virginia area have created a regional summit for public school counselors titled "EVERY Day is CAREER Day".

Led by Drs. Carol Kaffenberger and Celeste Murphy from George Mason University, Dr. Pam Brott from Virginia Tech, Dr. Tammy Davis from Marymount University and Drs.Pat Schwallie-Giddis and Rebecca Dedmond from George Washington University, this half day event will gather 150 K-12 public school counselors to focus on their school system's approach to career curricula. *Redefining Career Development through a Life Roles Perspective* is the topic of Dr. Pam Brott's keynote address.

The response from school districts has been strong. The depth and variety of resources provided through the counselor educators will make this program a focused, meaningful event for school counselors.



The National Career Development Association (NCDA) promotes career development through its annual celebration of National Career Development Month. Every November, career development professionals are encouraged to celebrate with career related activities. In particular, NCDA sponsors an annual Poetry and Poster Contest.

Eligibility

Every adult and student enrolled in public, private, and parochial schools in states with participating NCDA state divisions are eligible. A complete list of participating state divisions will be available September 2007 on the NCDA website at www.ncda.org. Contest division areas include:

Each entry should celebrate and inspire career development with a positive tone.

Requirements for Poems

Poetic Form: Use of any acceptable poetic form (e.g. cinquain, free verse, diamante, haiku, limerick, metered, rhyming, blank verse).

Size: Submit each poem on a single sheet of paper 8.5" X 11" in 12 point font.

Requirements for Posters

Lettering: Simple bold lettering is preferred. Captions are to be used to convey the message, attract attention, and to achieve goals of clarity, vigor and originality. All lettering will be considered part of the design

Media (Revised Catagories)

Category 1 (C1): Standard use of ink, pencil, poster paints, magic marker, acrylics, and oils.

<u>Category 2 (C2)</u>: Use of photos, clipart, graphic art software, collage, cut and pasted paper, and mixed media.

Size: Each poster must be created in 8.5" by 11" format, including matte, to be eligible.

Contest Deadlines

Building/School Contest Completed and Postmarked by November 14, 2007 First, second, and third place winners in the Building/School Contest should be sent to the County/District Contest.

County/District Contest Completed and Postmarked by December 4, 2007

First, second, and third place winners in the County/District Contest should be sent to the State Contest

State Contest Completed and Postmarked to National Contest by January 19, 2008

<u>ALL</u> entries <u>MUST</u> go thru the State Contest. The state chair is responsible to have their winning entries delivered to the National Chair by January 19, 2008.

Judging Process

Teams: Each judging team will consist of educators, including a member of the language arts and/or arts department, parents, and a representative from business/industry in the community. Selection of judges is left to the discretion of the contest coordinators.

Criteria: Judging will be based on originality, creativity, and development of the national theme. Poems will be evaluated on appropriate form, execution, spelling, and grammar. Poster evaluation will focus on the appropriate use of media, lettering, and basic principals of art. Please adhere to the size requirements for each entry as many entries are received.

State Awards

The state chair is responsible to have their winning entries delivered to the National Chair by January 19, 2008. State coordinators are responsible for coordinating prizes, certificates, and celebration for their state winners. <u>ALL</u> entries <u>MUST</u> go thru the State Contest.

County/District and building awards are made at the discretion of the local coordinators.

National Awards

The National Chair in coordination with the NCDA Headquarter Office will prepare the national awards. National awards will be given to the first, second, and third place winners in the six divisions in both the Poetry and Poster Contests. Certificates of participation will be given to all national entries.

National winners will be recognized with the winning entries placed on the NCDA global website, www.ncda.org, by April 15, 2008. The winning entries will also be on display at the Annual Global Conference to be held in Washington D.C., July 9-11, 2008. In addition, National winners will receive from the National Career Development Association: a framed certificate and a special congratulations gift.

WHAT IS A GLOBAL CAREER DEVELOPMENT FACILITATOR (GCDF)?

This occupational title designates individuals working in a variety of career development settings. A CDF may serve as a career group facilitator, job search trainer, career resource center coordinator, career coach, career development case manager, intake interviewer, occupational and labor market information person, human resource career development coordinator, employment/placement specialist or workforce development staff person.

The counseling profession has made great progress in defining professional counseling and the career counseling specialty through such efforts as NCDA's career counseling competencies and code of ethics and state licensing and registry requirements. However, several professional groups recognized that many individuals who are currently providing career assistance are not professional counselors. The CDF credential was developed to provide standards, training specifications and credentialing for these career providers. The goal was to define and differentiate two levels of career practice.
